
#### **Shelter Life Productions**

## Happy Beginnings—Tails of True Love!

This is what it's all about! ADOPTIONS, Rescues, and "Fur-ever Homes!"

Jokum's Story - (Jane Almon, Front Street Volunteer) Jokum was adopted from Front St Animal Shelter I year ago (Jan 2013) and came back to the shelter as a "stray" a year later (January 2014) Calls and letters to the registered owner went unanswered. Jokum sat in the shelter. He sat and sat and sat. He had initially passed his behavior evaluation and was deemed "adoptable" but the more time he spent at the shelter the more stressed he became. He had participated in the Chako Pit bull U program and many volunteers worked hard and long to give him the attention he needed. Yet he continued to decline due to the stress of being kenneled.

It came time to make a hard decision about Jokum....only able to be housed by himself (due to dog to dog aggressive tendencies), the shelter was filled to the brim and couldn't afford to keep dogs in single kennels while so many kept coming through the doors. We arranged for Jokum to go to Kings Kastle Rehabilitation in Windsor where he could de-stress and be a "dog" again! After a month's stay at Kings Kastle he had made great progress but it was not recommended he go back to the kennel environment. We worked and worked to find a foster for this sweet boy but had no one in sight on the afternoon he arrived back to the shelter from Kings Kastle.

A wonderful volunteer met a man in the parking lot and started talking to him about Jokum...pretty soon the man wanted to meet Jokum. It was love at first sight but David wasn't ready to adopt. He had just lost his dog quite suddenly and was dealing with some personal issues and couldn't commit to having a dog (for life). He wouldn't leave though, he kept looking back at lokum. We approached him about foster and he said he would think about it...again he didn't leave, he kept

looking at lokum through the window as he proceeded to his car. He came back the next day to complete the foster process and home Jokum went.

It took a few months but finally the call came and David said he was ready to adopt him. Again, weeks went by and David didn't come to the shelter to complete the adoption.

Then, just a few weeks ago, Jokum got out of David's house, was missing for hours. David was frantic, walking the streets and calling the shelter. Later that afternoon a good Samaritan brought Jokum to the shelter (they knew he belonged at Front St because of his tag) The manager on duty called David with the wonderful news and she said David came to the shelter in record time..all adoption paperwork was completed and David and Jokum are now an "official" family!

A lot of people helped Jokum on his journey...a journey that would have been cut short had David not stepped up to Foster him. Thank you to everyone who was involved in this love story.

our brand new volunteers, to our new-to-doghandling volunteers, to volunteers who are learning any other skill or job - they all need mentors!



## To Schedule or Not to Schedule - Survey Results

**The issue:** there are many days here at Front Street where we do not have enough volunteers to get the work done, while there are other days where we have too many volunteers and people are frustrated.

**Solution under consideration:** Switch from a self-scheduling system (what we currently use) to assigning volunteers the days and shifts they should work.

#### **Survey results:**

♦ Do you prefer a flexible or set schedule? Results:

90.16% of volunteers prefer a flexible schedule

♦ Do you sign up online to schedule the shifts that you volunteer? Results:

72.13% of respondents sign up every time they come in

14.75% sign up once in a while, but still come in sometimes without signing up

13.11% Never bother to sign up

♦ Why or Why Not? Results:

The number one reason why volunteers don't sign up before coming in has to do with their own personal schedule—they don't always know in advance when they are available, so come in as they can.

Which types of activities do you sign up for online? Results:

75.41% Training Classes

51.64% Special Events

69.67% Routine Chores

9.84% Don't sign up

♦ On my volunteer profile I have requested to have my schedule emailed to me weekly so I know when I am scheduled: Results:

28.69% Yes

41.80% No - I didn't know about this feature

29.51% No - this doesn't meet my needs

♦ On my volunteer profile I use the calendar feature to add my volunteer shifts to my electronic calendar: Results:

10.66% Yes

64.75% No.

5.74% Sometimes


18.85% I didn't know I could do that

♦ How comfortable are you with the online system? Results:

81.15% Very comfortable & proficient

13.93% Use as best I can

4.92% Never use it



♦ I would like to have more training on the volunteer system:

13.11% Yes

86.89% No

♦ Do you think that scheduling shifts is important:

81.15% Yes

18.85% No

Based on the results of this survey and the suggestions made by you - our volunteer team - this is what we propose to solve the scheduling issue and to ensure we always have enough volunteer coverage to achieve our mission of saving lives:

- 1. Everyone is expected to use their volunteer profile to sign up for shifts and to log your hours. We must know when you are expected in and whether or not we have the shift covered. For those whose schedule varies, the lock-out time for most of the shifts have been adjusted to I hour so you can sign up with only one hour's notice. Training sessions still require a little more notice.
- 2. If you need assistance with the MyVolunteerPage program, simply ask for help! I will sit down with you and go over exactly how to do things so you are comfortable and also print you the user's guide for your reference.
- 3. In order to ensure we have enough coverage for each day, we are asking each volunteer to sign up for a MINIMUM of one day of basic shelter chores per month even if you have completed your 20 hours, and a MINIMUM of one shift per month for any specialty position for which you have received training (Cattery work, shelter greeter, adoption counselor, etc.) We have put a lot of effort into your volunteer training, and we would like the return commitment from you. (Dog handlers—you already have committed to working at least two hours a week with our dogs in return for the training you have received. Please make sure you are following through with that commitment!)
- 4. We absolutely welcome and encourage you to you sign up for multiple shifts— sign up for as many days as you want!
- 5. If you are physically unable to work the basic shelter chores, that is OK—there are many other ways to help, just let me know! Volunteering should never be physically painful for someone. We just want you to be involved and engaged and to ensure that all of our shifts are covered.
- 6. For those of you who have the flexibility to work during the week, please make it a point to sign up for weekday shifts as those are the days we need the most help!
- 7. For those of you who prefer a set schedule, please sign up for your days and shifts online so we always know whether or not you are coming. You have the power to assign yourself to the days that you want to work.
- 8. If all of the basic chores are done when you arrive there are a 1001 other things to do here at the shelter take a good look around you and jump in and help! Sweep a sidewalk, wipe down benches, wash windows, pick up trash, etc.!!

Let's all work together to save lives - that's what volunteering here is all about! We simply cannot function without our volunteer team. We need everyone working together toward our mission and we should never have days where we have no volunteer help with the basic shelter chores. Can I count on your commitment to Team Front Street?


